This week we had Aunty Lee Healy visit the school and talk to the kids about the indigenous aspects of our community. The students really enjoyed her visit and asked lots of interesting questions to build their knowledge of indigenous culture. 

HEALTHY LUNCH BOX CHOICES

MAKE IT EASY – The key is to not make eating the food too difficult to eat and that they are able to open their lunchbox and food independently. ie. if their little fingers struggle to peel a mandarin, then peel it at home for them or choose an alternative option.

USE LEFT OVERS – Make a little extra for dinner, using the left overs as a lunch option. <u>Fried rice</u>, <u>pasta</u> etc make great additions to the lunchbox.

FRUIT AND VEGETABLES – Include a mix of fruits and vegetables in lunchboxes to boost nutrition to make sure the kids are getting their essential vitamins and minerals. Add in some vegetable sticks with dip (avocado or hummus) for an element of crunch.

GO FOR WATER – It's so important to teach your kids to stay hydrated! We need around 8 glasses of fluid each day and water is the best choice. Packing a water bottle with their lunch is the best way for them to develop the habit of staying hydrated and helps remind them to drink regularly.



Firstly I would like to start by saying a massive thank you to the 2019 Parents Club Committee: Kate Newman, Tash Gemenis, Marisa Hodge, Andrea Hall, Hayley Crowle, Danny McKernan and Jai Harrington. We have had a great year, very enjoyable to work with this group of people and it has been a very successful year. Thank you again and hope to see you all back on board this year.

Also a massive thank you to all the other parents, staff, families, friends who have helped out with our fundraisers etc. throughout the year. It's always nice and much appreciated to have extra people on deck to help out.

We organised, run, helped run, been involved in many in house and outside events through 2019 — with no major hiccups or failures. We had a couple of events we were involved in that we knew would not make us much, if any money but we participated as a support to the community. These events included the Million Paws Walk and the Eildon Big Fish — we did not lose money which was great but was a lot of time and effort and on selling after the events to make a profit — but like I said it was the right thing to do for the community who give the school so much.

Our major fundraiser for the year was our annual Drive in night where we made \$4,254.36 profit. This was a lot of hard work but was a successful event. We have booked Saturday 25th April for 2020, 2 weeks after school holidays has finished – hoping people will be settled back in to routine and ready to travel up for the night. Our second major fundraiser for the year was the annual Eildon Community Charity Golf Day which we received \$3,000.00, Lions Club \$1,000.00 and Eildon Golf Club \$1,000.00. Again a lot of hard work but has paid off well and truly. Very successful day and the plan is to begin organising the 2020 Golf day, months in advance rather than weeks (that was the plan this year but did not happen due to rest of committee been retired and away for the entire winter and part of spring).

We had many other fundraisers through the year all making the following profits: Easter raffle \$243.00, X-Country \$1,185.40, Mother's Day stall/raffle \$445.50, Million Paws Walk \$244.60, Goulburn Fishing Festival bake sale \$457.00, Father's Day Stall/raffle \$227.00, Eildon Boat Show \$2,000.00, Eildon Big Fish \$184.14, Dindi Naturals Fundraiser \$189.50, Christmas Raffle \$277.00

Total profits for 2019: approx. **\$12,707.50**

We have put money towards many things this year including:

Stage, Snow bus, School Camp, Writers Festival Bus, Flying Fox, Graduation and more. We have also purchased a heavy duty/sign written 3 x 3m marquee for our fundraisers (which we used for first time at Cluster swimming sports, it looked great and worked awesome – very good purchase).
